### What is the Rule of Thirds?

The Rule of Thirds is a general guidelines for placing Primary and Secondary Centres of Interest within your frame.

General rule for laying out your composition




#### Rule Thirds in Practice

- 1. Mentally divide your frame into thirds both horizontally & vertically.
- 2. Intersection points are where your center(s) of interest should be located






## Examples of Thirds

# Thirds Need Not Apply!

- If the subject is too big to fit at an intersection point.
- Geometry within the frame/of the subject tells the story.

point.





